## BEAR MOUNTAIN & BEYOND

Prior to the start of the season, we revealed that 12 new trails and 4 new skin tracks would make their debut for the 21/22 season. Thanks to a series of early season storms, the terrain on Bear Mountain opened a whole month earlier than the previous season! Included in this opening was a portion of the new, never-before-skied terrain – such as new favorite runs Cougar Hunt and The Honeypot. In March, we received our second biggest storm of the season, and the Pucker Chutes – our most extreme terrain – opened for the first time.

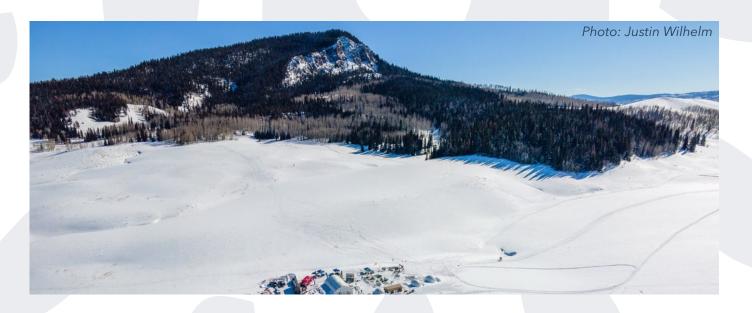
